

HOW TO DRAW YOUR OWN SHAKESPEARE CARTOONS BY MARCIA WILLIAMS

Anyway, life takes many twists and turns and I ended up writing and illustrating and eventually, rewriting and illustrating Shakespeare's plays. Only it was better than that: I got to act all the parts, direct the play and be the costume designer - what could be more fun!

Now it is your turn to direct, act and design your Shakespeare play. You will see that I have given you a few tips, but I don't think you will need them because I can already hear the audience shout "BRAVO!"

Speech bubbles

- ◆ Speech bubbles always read from left to right.
- ◆ Keep the bubbles up at the top of your picture so you have more room for your drawing.
- ◆ Write the text first, then draw the bubble around it. Otherwise, you might have trouble fitting the words into your bubble!

Drawing characters

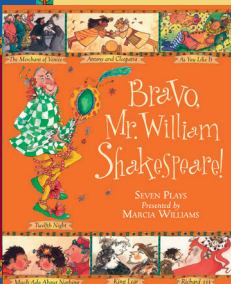
- ◆ Make sure each character looks very different so that your reader doesn't get muddled.
- ◆ Your characters will look more interesting if you exaggerate some of their features. For instance: if he or she has a big nose, make it a real hooter, and if he or she is tall, make them as tall as a tree!

Telling the story

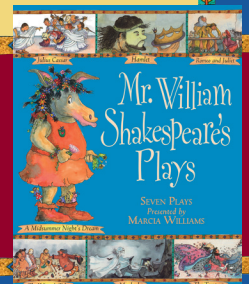
- ◆ There isn't a right way to tell a story. When you retell a story it becomes your own, so tell it YOUR way.
- ◆ Keep your sentences short and clear. The words are the bones of the story - you can add flesh and colour with speech bubbles and pictures.

The two youngsters fell in love, as Prospero had planned. Adversity, he hoped, would seal the bond, so he accused Ferdinand of spying.	He forbade Miranda to talk to Ferdinand and sent him to shift logs, which Ferdinand did willingly, to stay close to his beloved.	
For hours, Ferdinand hauled logs. Miranda never left his side.	Prospero watched Miranda and Ferdinand's love blossom, and finally he relented.	He conjured up a flock of nymphs to sing a blessing on their engagement.
Meanwhile, Caliban gathered driftwood until a looming figure made him hide under his cloak.	It was Trinculo, King Alonso's jester who, fearing a storm, also crawled under the cloak.	Minutes later, Stefano, the king's drunken butler, fell over the heaving bundle.

Trinculo and Stefano were delighted to be reunited. Caliban, unaware of the shipwreck, thought they had dropped from the moon.	Thinking they must be very powerful, Caliban urged the pair to assassinate Prospero. Ariel overheard and flew off to tell his master.	
When the traitor Caliban drew near with his companions, Prospero was ready. Ariel had strewn Prospero's finest clothes before the cave.	Caliban, Trinculo, and Stefano crept up, ready to kill Prospero, but were distracted by the array of handsome garments.	
<p>When the murderous trio were half dressed, Prospero unleashed a pack of snarling phantom hounds. Driven by Ariel, the dogs chased the rascals far off across the island. Then Ariel returned to aid Prospero: the time had come for him to settle the score with his brother and King Alonso.</p>		
King Alonso, Antonio, and the good Gonzalo had been vainly searching for Ferdinand.	Tired and hungry, they were in despair, but then a table of food suddenly materialized.	Amazed, they were about to eat when Ariel, disguised as a harpy, made the food vanish.
Ariel reminded them of their sins against Prospero. Guilt and fear froze their spirits.	Ariel drew them into a magic circle, where they were held like unwilling statues.	Prospero, in his ducal robes, appeared before them as though risen from the dead.

<p>Antonio and King Alonso were awestruck into true repentance and begged to be forgiven. At last Prospero's anger was placated.</p>	<p>Prospero released them from the circle and led them, and his old friend Gonzalo, to where Ferdinand and Miranda sat playing chess.</p>
<p>King Alonso was overjoyed at finding his son alive and embraced him warmly. Ferdinand told the king of his wish to marry Miranda. Seeing Miranda's beauty and his son's happiness, King Alonso gave his consent. He hoped the union would heal the rift between Milan and Naples.</p>	
<p>Into the midst of their rejoicing came Caliban, Trinculo, and Stefano, urged on by Ariel. Prospero forgave them too, in return for a little hard labor. The party then made themselves comfortable, while Prospero recounted his adventures of the past twelve years.</p>	
<p>They all planned to sail to Naples the next morning for the wedding of Miranda and Ferdinand, after which Prospero would return to Milan as its rightful duke. That night, Prospero released his faithful Ariel, who promised him fair winds for their journey. Then Prospero discarded his magic cloak, buried his staff deep in the ground, and threw his book of magic out to sea. After twelve years, Prospero was leaving the enchanted island to Caliban and the sprites. Prospero's tempest had served its purpose, and his dukedom was restored.</p>

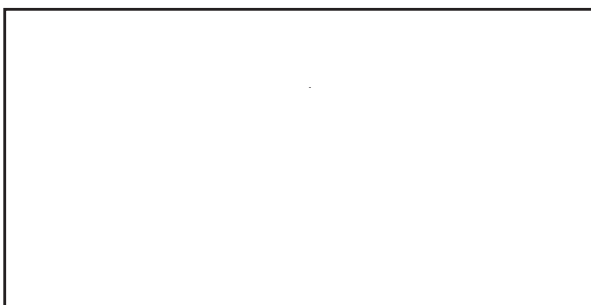
MONTAGUES

ROMEO *and* JULIET



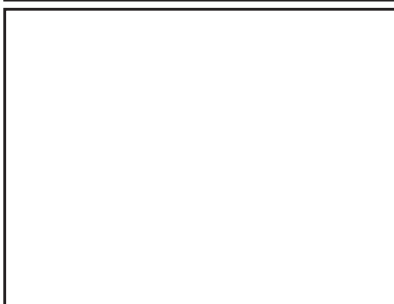

Unfortunately, Romeo was recognized by Lord Capulet's fiery nephew, Tybalt.



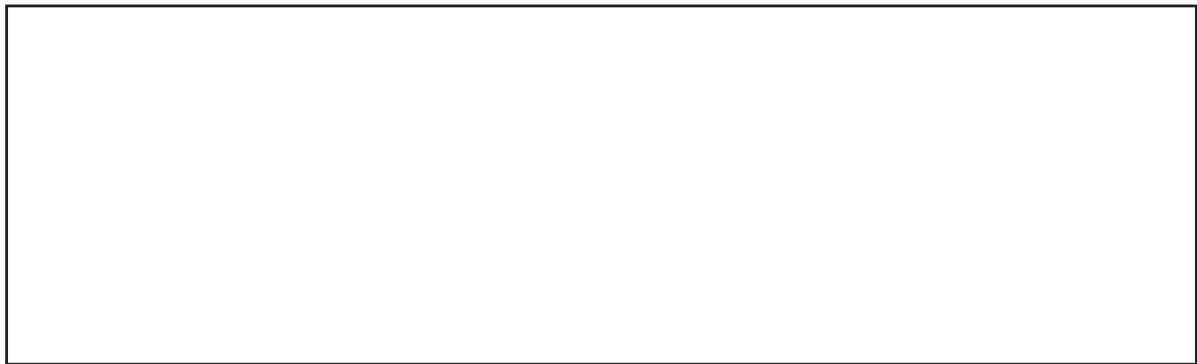
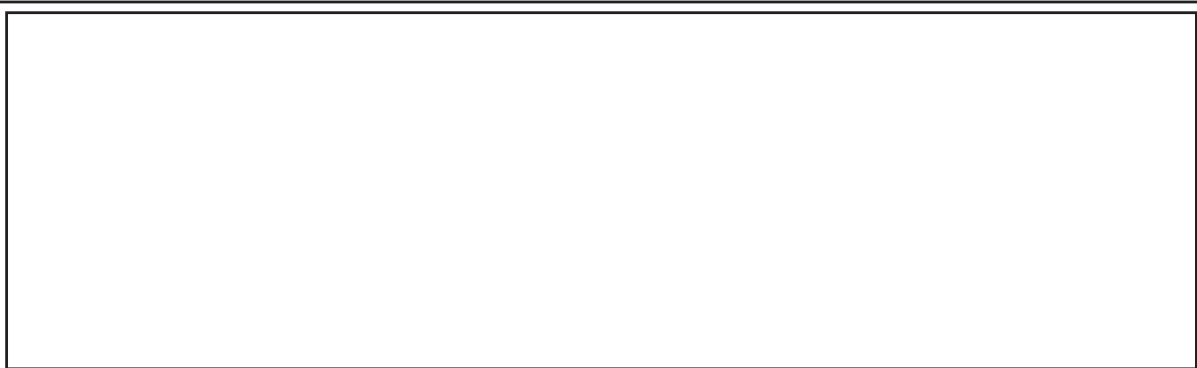
But Lord Capulet forbade fighting at his ball and made Romeo welcome.

Just before the witches vanished they also prophesied that Banquo would never be king, but that he would father kings.

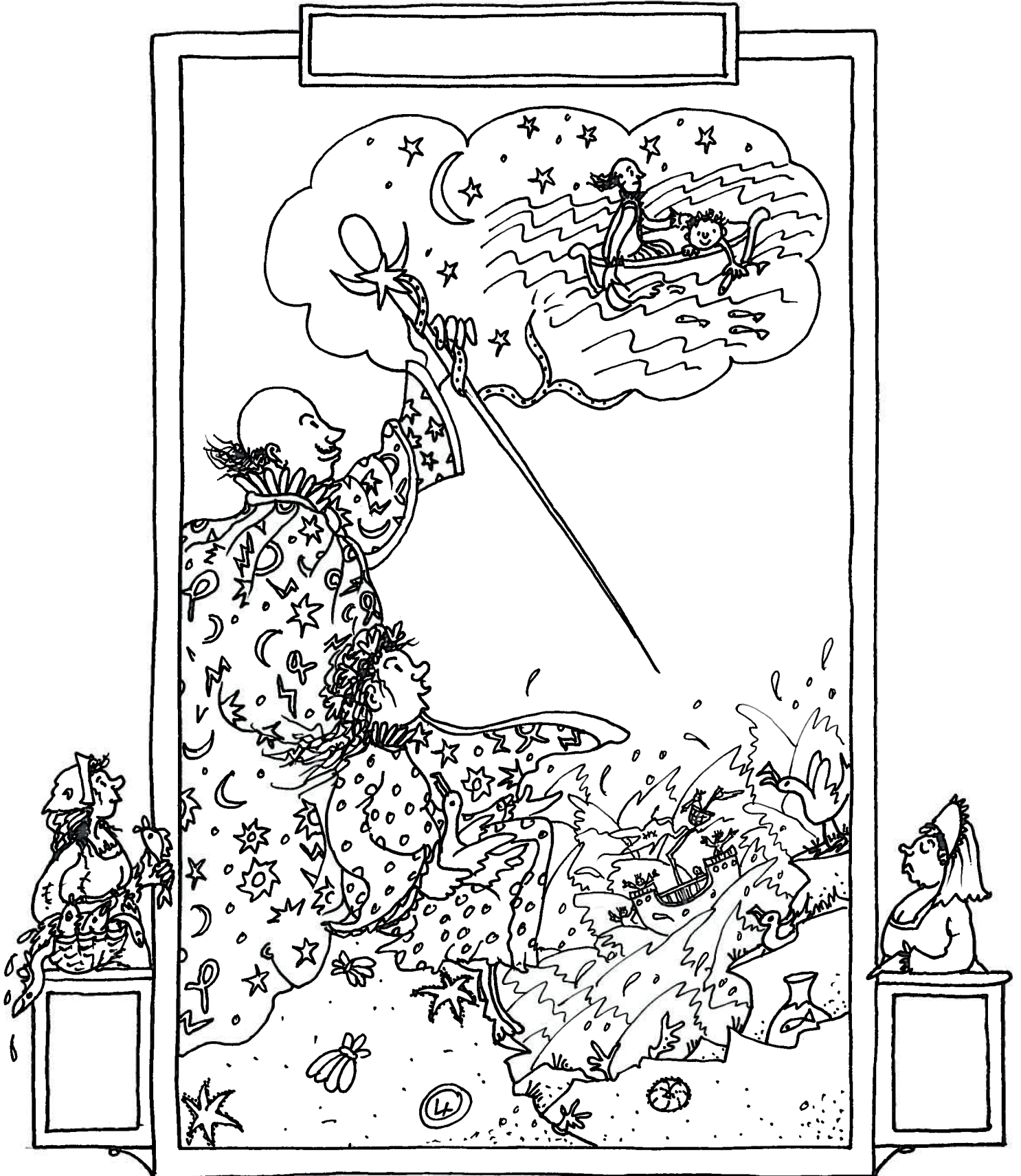


As the two generals stood, stunned, news arrived that the king had made Macbeth Thane of Cawdor, in honour of his victory.

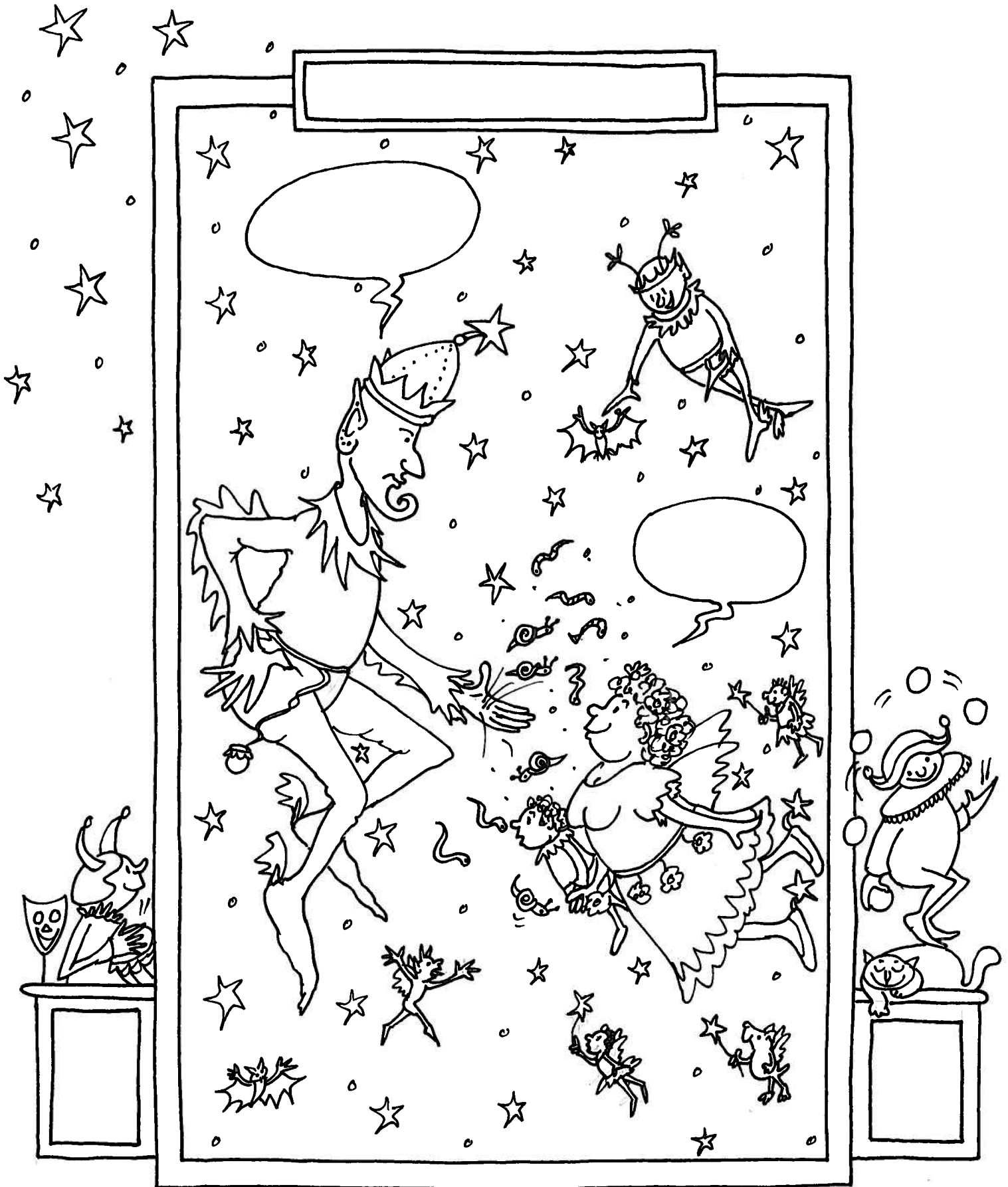
THE TEMPEST
